


GROUNDWATER BASIN UPDATE FOR AUGUST 2022

GROUNDWATER BASINS AT A GLANCE*





SUMMARY

Staff monitors groundwater conditions in the District's service area throughout the year. A summary of the latest information is presented below.

Precipitation (Oct. 1, 2021 - August 9, 2022)

The WRD precipitation index reports that for the 2021-22 Water there has been Year. below average rainfall (10.83 inches) through August 9, 2022. The normal rainfall for this time period is 15.31 inches, so the District is 71% of normal. As of August 9, 2022, the U.S. Drought Monitor reporting 100% of the State is abnormally 100% dry, moderate, 98% under severe (same), 60% under extreme (-14%), and 17% exceptional (+3%) drought conditions.



Current drought conditions are expected to persist and La Nina conditions will likely continue through the end of 2022 resulting in a rare third consecutive La Nina year.




Díd you know?

About a quarter of all u.s. rainfall becomes groundwater. Groundwater provides much of the flow of many streams; many lakes and streams are "windows" to the water table. In large part, the flow in a stream represents water that has flowed from the ground into the stream channel. The usgs estimates that about 30% of u.s. streamflow is from groundwater, although it is higher in some locations and less in others.

Reservoirs (as of August 10, 2022)

For the 21 reservoirs reported monthly to the committee, water levels have increased in 1 of 21 reservoirs. The increase occurred at Castaic Lake (<0.01 million acre feet, MAF). The largest decrease (-0.31 MAF) occurred at Lake Powell. The smallest decrease (<0.0 MAF) occurred at Cachuma, Casitas, Perris, and Silverwood Lakes.



These 21 reservoirs are at 30% capacity (22.68 MAF) which is down 1.60 MAF from the prior month (-1.25 MAF State Water Project [SWP] and -0.35 MAF Colorado River Aqueduct [CRA]).


Optimum and Minimum Groundwater Quantity

In response to a 2002 State audit of the District's activities, the Board of Directors adopted an Optimum and Minimum Quantity for groundwater in the District to define an appropriate operating range that would sustain adjudicated pumping rights, leave room for future storage projects, and identify a lower limit. The amounts are based on the accumulated overdraft concept, which the District tracks year by year based on changes in groundwater storage.

After an extensive review of over 70 years of water level fluctuations and discussions with the Board and pumping community, Water Year 1999/2000 was recognized as a representative year for the Optimum Quantity, which equated to an accumulated overdraft of approximately 612,000 acre feet. The Minimum Quantity was defined as an accumulated overdraft of 900,000 acre feet, which allowed an operating range from 0 acre feet (minimum) to 288,000 acre feet (optimum). The Board also adopted a policy to make-up the groundwater deficit should the accumulated overdraft fall too far below the Optimum Quantity.

The Accumulated Overdraft as of August 5, 2022, has been estimated at 830,466 acre feet (subject to change), which is 69,534 acre feet above the Minimum Quantity and 218,466 acre feet below the Optimum Quantity. The Basin is at 24% of Optimum Quantity which is 4% lower than what was reported last month (~9,000 AF lower).

GW Basin Operating Range







Montebello Forebay Spreading Grounds (July 2021 - June 2022)

The following Charts shows the preliminary spreading grounds replenishment water for the current Fiscal Year (2021-22; 12 months) and Water Year (2020-21; 9 months):





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No imported water purchases are planned for Fiscal Year 2021-22.

Local water (stormwater plus dry weather urban runoff) is captured by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works (LACPW) at the spreading grounds for recharge. Local water amounts are determined as the sum of the total waters conserved at the spreading grounds less the imported and recycled water deliveries. For the 2021-22 Fiscal Year, approximately 23,816 acre feet of local water capture has been reported by the LACPW.

Preliminary numbers for the 2021-22 Fiscal Year show that approximately 66,230 acre feet of recycled water has been recharged with 11,616 acre

feet consisting of advanced treat water from the ARC AWTF and 54,614 acre tertiary feet recycled Presuming the advanced treated water as "Null Water", the 120-month running average of the recycled contribution in the Montebello Forebay is 42.6% and the regulatory maximum is 45%, with additional monitoring being required once 40% is reached. WRD and LACSD submitted the additional monitoring plan on May 26, 2021. Implementation of the plan commence upon acceptance by the RWQCB.


Tertiary Recycle Water Permit Update


The permit is progressing with LACSD and WRD staff working with both

LARWQCB and CA-DDW regulators to respond the questions and update pertinent sections of the new Title 22 Engineering Report. LACSD continues to work on two major studies needed for the new Title 22 Engineering Report – Biodegradable Dissolve Organic Carbon (BDOC) Study and Virus Logarithmic Reduction Value (LRV) Study.

Due to the continued mega drought and recent emergency drought proclamation by Governor Newsom, LACSD and WRD submitted a request to modify the recycled water contribution percentage to 50% and the advanced treated water classification to diluent in a letter to the LARWQCB and CA-DDW dated July 8, 2022. A copy of the letter was provided at the July Water Resources Committee meeting.


Spreading Grounds Recharge Jul 2021 - Jun 2022






Seawater Barrier Well Injection and Replenishment (July 2021 - June 2022)

The following Chart shows the barrier water injection:




Preliminary numbers for the 2021-22 Fiscal Year show that the West Coast Barrier has used 10,877 acre feet of the total 16,000 acre feet planned for injection, 68% of total for the Fiscal Year. The Dominguez Gap Barrier used 8,269 acre feet of the total 8,000 acre feet planned for injection, 103% of the total for the Fiscal Year. The Alamitos Barrier, on the WRD side, used 4,565 acre feet of the total 4,500 acre feet planned for injection, 101% of the total for the Fiscal Year.



Total Pumping (Fiscal Year July 2021 – June 2022)

Preliminary numbers for groundwater production in the District for the Fiscal Year 2021-22 (July 2022 - June 2022) indicate total pumping in the Central Basin was down 8,226 acre feet from the same time of the previous fiscal year (-4.5%) and the West Coast Basin total pumping was 1,653 acre feet higher than the previous fiscal year (+5.6%). The total pumping is 208,998 acre feet compared to 215,570 acre feet during the same time the previous year for a decrease of 6,572.5 acre feet, or -3.0%. The current pumping data do not include six (6) Central Basin pumpers and one (1) West Coast Basin pumper who have not yet reported for an estimated 60 additional acre feet.






Interesting...

Out of all the freshwater in the world, minus the polar ice caps, about 95% is groundwater.

Preliminary numbers indicate 208,998 acre feet have been pumped this fiscal year and is 6.3% below the projected goal of 223,000 acre feet (or -14,002 acre feet). Monthly actual production versus the 7-year average monthly production projections (FY 2015 through 2021) are included in the chart below.

For the Fiscal Year 2021-22 (July 2021 - June 2022), staff has tracked the production trends of the top five (5) producing pumpers and the bottom five (5) producing pumpers in each basin. These pumpers are identified in the following tables and are based on the change in volume (in acre feet) compared to the same time period for the previous Fiscal Year.
